


Thank you to Joel Alsdorf for his many years of involvement with the Spartansburg Fair.

# 2024 PA Preferred® **Junior Baking Contest Cookies, Brownies and Bars**

The goal of the PA Preferred® Baking Contest is to encourage young people across the Commonwealth to participate in Pennsylvania's agricultural fairs by showcasing Pennsylvania grown and produced products in their contest entries.

### RULES:

- 1. Open to any individual amateur baker (ages 8 through 18 at the time of the fair's contest) who is a Pennsylvania resident. One entry per person.
- 2. Entrants may NOT have won 1st place in this PA Preferred® Junior Baking contest at any other fair in 2024.
- Entry must be six (6) individual sized portions of the baked entry item (cookies, brownies or bars).
   The Cookies, Brownies or Bars, and any fillings and frostings, must be made from scratch with edible ingredients. No pre-packaged ingredients may be used (ex: no pre-made mixes, cookie dough, pie crust, frosting, etc.). Any decorations must just be edible.
- 5. At least two (2) PA Preferred® or locally produced ingredients must be used in the recipe. Some examples of qualifying ingredients include grains (such as oats or flour), butter, milk, eggs, fruits and/or vegetables.
- 6. A PA Preferred® logo is not required because not all PA Preferred® products carry the label. The name of the ingredient and the source is sufficient (see attached example). Contact RA-AGPAPreferred@pa.gov for any assistance with qualifying ingredients.
- 7. Entry must be submitted for judging on a food safe disposable setting. (All pans, plates and dishes are considered to be disposable and will not be returned.)
- 8. Recipe(s) must be submitted with the entry, printed on one side of 8-1/2" x 11" sheets of paper. Recipe must list all ingredients, quantities, and the preparation instructions. The name of each PA Preferred® ingredient or locally produced ingredient must be clearly listed along with the name of the source that made/grew the product (ex: PA Preferred Milk - Galliker's brand or Apples - Smith Farm Orchard). Entrant's name, age, address and phone number must be printed on the back side of all the pages. (All recipes and cookies-brownies-bars will become the property of the Fair or PA Farm Show and will not be returned.)
- 9. Refrigeration is not available at the fair or PA Farm Show. Entries that require refrigeration after baking must indicate so in the recipe. Those entries will not be sold, auctioned or otherwise distributed for consumption after judging for food safety reasons.

Each county/local fair is encouraged to conduct a 36th Annual Blue Ribbon Apple Pie Contest at their 2024 event. Listed below are the criteria which we would like each fair to use in their contest. The certified first place winner from each fair will then have the opportunity to enter an apple pie in the BLUE RIBBON APPLE PIE CONTEST at the 2025 PENNSYLVANIA FARM SHOW.

**RULES** for local Fair and the PA Farm Show contests are as follows:

- 1. Open to any individual **amateur** baker who is a Pennsylvania resident. One entry per person.
- 2. Entrants may <u>NOT</u> have won 1st place in this Blue Ribbon Apple Pie contest at any other fair in 2024.
- 3. The Apple Pie, including fillings and crust, must be made from scratch with edible ingredients. No pre-packaged ingredients may be used (ex: no pre-made mixes, cookie dough, pie crust, frosting, etc.) Any decorations must just be edible.
- 4. Recipe **must include at least 60% apples in the filling**. It does not need to be a "traditional" two crusted apple pie and it can have a variety of fillings.
- 5. The entire pie must be submitted for judging in a food safe disposable pie pan. (All pans, plates and dishes are considered to be disposable and will not be returned.)
- 6. The recipe for the pie and pie crust must be submitted with the entry. It should be submitted on one side of 8 ½" by 11" sheets of paper. The recipe must list all the ingredients, quantities, and the preparation instructions. Entrant's name, address and phone number must be printed on the back side of all the pages. (All recipes and pies will become the property of the Fair or PA Farm Show and will not be returned.)
- Refrigeration is not available at the Fair or PA Farm Show. Entries that require refrigeration after baking must indicate so in the recipe. Those entries will not be sold, auctioned or otherwise distributed for consumption after judging for food safety reasons.
- 8. Judging will be based on the following criteria:

Flavor		30 points
Filling: consistency, doneness, moistnes	s & flavor	25 points
Crust: color, flavor, texture doneness		20 points
Overall Appearance		15 points
Creativity		10 points
-	TOTAL	100 Points

Creativity is essential to a varied competition. Do not limit your contest to a "traditional" two-crusted apple pie. We are looking for a variety of fillings in the pies; the pie must include <u>at least 60% apples</u> in the filling.

Each Fair must submit the Contest Summary Report verifying the winning apple pie baker. This person will then be eligible to enter the state competition at the 2025 PA Farm Show and will receive the <u>Official PA Farm Show Certification Entry Form</u> directly from the PA Fairs Special Baking Contest Committee by December 2.

<u>NOTE</u>: If an individual has already won 1st place at another fair in 2024 for this Blue Ribbon Apple Pie contest, that individual is now considered qualified through that Fair to compete at the 2025 PA Farm Show and is no longer eligible to enter this contest at any upcoming Fairs.



## ANTIQUE TRACTOR PULL RULES

- 1. Open to tractors 1965 and older.
- 2. Weights: Bolt type. Securely fastened to manufacturer's intended position. NO weight brackets or suitcase weights.
- 3. Stock condition only: As from the factory. No pulling enhancement modifications.
  - a. Stock block and naturally aspirated (except: if originally factory-equipped with GM two-stroke diesel engine).
  - b. Stock head, manifold, carburetor, and air cleaner
  - c. Replacement manifold: manufacturer parts accepted for make and model of tractor.
  - d. Stock engine RPM.
  - e. Engine parts not found in parts book for specific tractor not allowed.
- 4. Fuel: No racing or aviation gasoline octane booster permitted. Fuel used for the pull must be used for dynamometer.
- 5. Tires: One size over or under factory original allowed. No cut tires, radial tires, or chains.
- Draw bar: Factory original: Stationary in all directions, 17" maximum height, 25" minimum length as measured at the top of the draw bar or pull point (7000 lbs and over)
- Clevis or shackle: Factory original: straight or twisted type; Minimum 2 ½" hole bolted or pinned tightly with spacer to draw bar.
  - a. Pull plate material allowed; no thinner than 34"; no thicker than 1 14". Must have 2 1/2" hole with 1" material thickness around the hole.
  - b. Drawbar must remain inside opening of the clevis.
  - c. NON-fixed draw bar (i.e., Draft control, 3 pt. or 2 pt. hitch) "must secure hitch in locked position".
  - d. Tractors without stationary hitch will pull "Exhibition Only".
  - e. <u>TOP OF HITCH ADJUSTER CAN NOT BE ABOVE CENTER LINE OF AXLE</u> <u>OR HUB except for factory mounts (as per safety committee 7/30/03)</u>
- 8. Testing: All subject to dynamometer and tachometer testing.
- Track Officials: May stop pull if tractor or driver is deemed unsafe, or if front wheels exceed 16" height.
- 10. No shifting of gears during pull, including torque amplifiers.
- 11. Drivers: Minimum age 16 and deemed capable by tech crew.
  - a. Cannot be under the influence of drugs or alcohol.
  - b. Must remain seated.
  - c. Must weigh tractor in. Tractor may be subject to re-weigh following pull.
- 12. Participants:
  - a. Can be disqualified for being discourteous to other participants or to officials.
  - b. Have three (3) minutes to line up when class is called, or face disqualification.
- 13. Appearance: Only parts in the parts book for tractor model are allowed.
  - a. Seats: Stock or replacement seat with stock mountings
  - b. Replacement alternators or straight exhaust pipes allowed.
  - c. Stock side shields allowed if factory equipped.
  - d. Tractor and wheel weights to an acceptable width; not to exceed 8' 6".
- 14. Speed limit is 3.5 MPH.
- 15. ALL DECISIONS OF THE TECH CREW AND/OR SAFETY CREW ARE FINAL.

## **GUIDELINES FOR CARE OF ANIMALS**

Each exhibitor should care for animals in a manner that is responsible and ethical.

**Restraining Animals** 

Animals should be tied or penned:

in a manner that will not hurt the animal or restrict its breathing in any way;

so that feet are fully on the ground and have enough room to stand and lie down;

so that they are not able to injure animals tied near them.

Animals unaccustomed to each other should not be penned together.

#### Handling

Rough handling which could harm the animal is prohibited. Use of whips, canes, and show sticks should be restricted to showing~only to guide, not punish. Animals respond quicker and better to quiet, gentle handling, than loud, rough handling.

#### Bedding

All animals should have bedding that is dry and cleaned regularly to keep the animals comfortable. If nontraditional bedding (such as carpeting) is used, it should be regularly cleaned (at least twice daily) to keep the pen free from manure.

#### Feeding & Water

Animals should be fed adequate amounts of feed and water to meet the animal's basic requirements. Failure to do so means disqualification

#### Transportation

Animals should be transported in a way that is safe and considerate of animal's well-being. Blanket/Sweat Collars - Should be large enough to permit normal body functions such

as breathing, eating, drinking or lying down.

#### Health

It is the responsibility of the exhibitors to provide proper health care for their animals through routine inspection and consultation with health care professionals.

The improper or illegal use of drugs or antibiotics is prohibited.

If medication is indicated, follow the label directions and allow more than stated withdrawal time.

## NATIONAL CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

IAFE (INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF FAIRS AND EXPOSITIONS)

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show.

In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics," Spartansburg Fair Rules apply. All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more

- than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example.
- Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the Spartansburg Fair. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

 All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.

- 2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair officials.
- 3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at the fair.

- 4. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal for testing. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event.
  - If the laboratory report on the chemical analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the approved laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question. Its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation transfer to the laboratory particular of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise at any hearing in regard to the matter conducted by the fair
- 5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
- 6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
- 7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair, or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation, and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
- 8.No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
- 9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
- 10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have any disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show against such individuals published in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notices to members.
- 11. The act of entering an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

## PENNSYLVANIA DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL ANIMALS

(Also check requirements for specific animals)

1. Verification of Veterinarian-client-patient-relationship (VCPR): The Animal Exhibition Sanitation Law requires attestation that a VCPR exists for all animals to be exhibited. This attestation states that the owner or caretaker of the animal has assumed responsibility to consult a veterinarian and has agreed to follow the instructions of the veterinarian in relation to animal diseases and implementing best management practices intended to reduce and prevent disease. This requirement can be fulfilled by any of the following means:

- (a) A Veterinarian-client-patient-relationship (VCPR) form with veterinarian's signature
- (b) A valid CVI ISSUED FOR SPARTANSBURG COMMUNITY FAIR after August 1,2024.
- 2. OUT OF STATE-Must provide a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after August 1, 2024.
- 3. Must be free of evidence of infectious / contagious diseases\
- 4. Animals appearing unhealthy upon arrival will not be permitted to enter the grounds.
- 5. VCPR must be presented at the time of inspection.

## ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS- PENNSYLVANIA

#### Cattle:

1. Official ear tag or other unique ID device approved by PDA.

Official ID includes:

A USDA-issued National Uniform Eartagging System (NUES)ear tag having a US shield; or -A 15 digit Animal ID Number (AIN) ear tag starting with "840" and having a US shield; or Other ID approved by the PDA (brands and breed registrations with tattoos are not acceptable)

## Goats and Sheep:

1. Official Identification includes:

A USDA ear tag with a US shield; or

A legible tattoo with herd and individual ID recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database a.k.a. scrapie tattoo (only for herds enrolled in the USDA Voluntary Scrapie Herd Certification Program); or

A breed registration tattoo if the animal is accompanied by a registration certificate and the tattoo is legible. Identification used for sheep and goats must be permanently affixed to the individual animal.

## ADDITIONAL RECOMMENDATIONS- PENNSYLVANIA

Equine (Horses, Mules):

- 1. All equine animals must be test negative for Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) by an official test within the 12 months prior to the opening date of the fair.
- 2. Laboratory test results must accompany each animal (a copy of the original lab report is acceptable). CVI shall specify the date of sample collection and test results.
- 3. Foals less than six months of age, accompanied by a test-negative dam, are exempt from EIA testing requirements. If the foal is not accompanied by the dam, a copy of the dam's test results must accompany the foal


